EXPEDITION TO THE EAST

Twelve intrepid crew members boarded the "S.S. Dallarbus" during the year under the leadership of Captain Davey Vass bound for the distant land of Corrigin.

The reason for the expedition was purely of a trading nature - trading hours of sleep and rest for a cricket match on the village green. The ship was well stacked with supplies (and so was the bosun) as she sailed from the port of East Fremantle.
